




Don't lump several together.






Look for accuracy.

Frontier: the land or territory that forms the furthest extent of a country's settled or inhabited regions.






Frontiers are by definition uncharted and mysterious regions.









The frontier is typically considered from a **non-Native** perspective.




"We did not think of the great open plains, the beautiful rolling hills, and winding streams with tangled growth, as "wild."




Settler: someone who settles.





Does it say, "white?"






Pioneer: a person who is among those who first enter or settle a region, thus opening it for occupation and development by others.


Thanksgiving





Has the person spent time living among the people? Remember: there are no guarantees.





How does the book depict Native clothing?




How about a connection to animals?

Who became more "Indian" than the Indians?






Who was his love interest? None other than a white woman.

Again the white man is more "Indian" than the Indians.






Once again, who are the love interests?






Both movies should get credit for using Native actors.

However, in Avatar, a white man "becomes" an Indian.






What does this say about Indians? About Hollywood?
